Your rights

- **Be vigilant.** Watch for suspicious or threatening activity. Bring concerns to state or local authorities. Share what you witness with media outlets you trust. *Call 911 if you see or experience violence.*

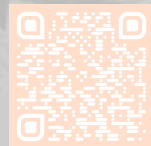

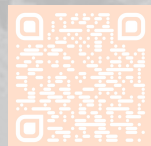

Select a white or light version of your logo with a transparent background, if applicable. To help with sizing, the logo placeholder box is 2.35 inches wide and 1.35 inches tall.

Go to the slide with the cover and delete the placeholder box on the cover of the pocket guide.

In PowerPoint, click Insert > Pictures, and then select the location of your logo. In Google Slides, click Insert > Image, and then select the location of your logo.

Copy that logo, paste it and replace the placeholder box on the second pocket guide cover (below the first one).

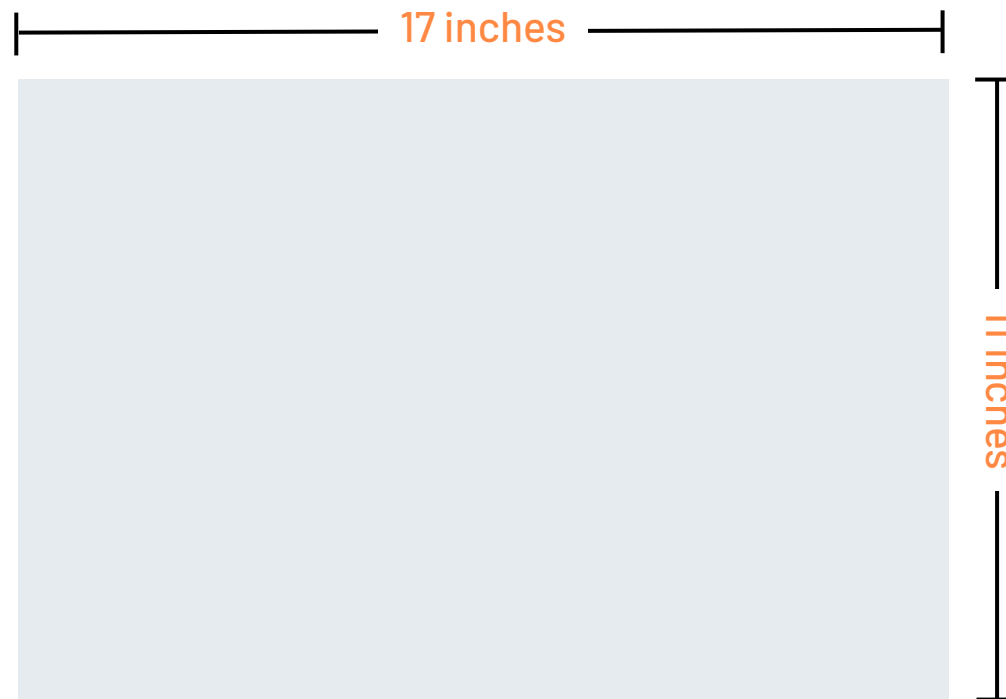

PRINTING INSTRUCTIONS

DIY PRINTING

- 1 Load 11x17-inch paper.
- 2 Select these printing options:
 - Landscape
 - Color
 - Double-sided
 - Flip on short side
- 3 If there is an option to minimize borders or to print to the edge, select that option.
- 4 Do a test print. Make any needed adjustments. Start printing your pocket guides!



PRINTSHOP

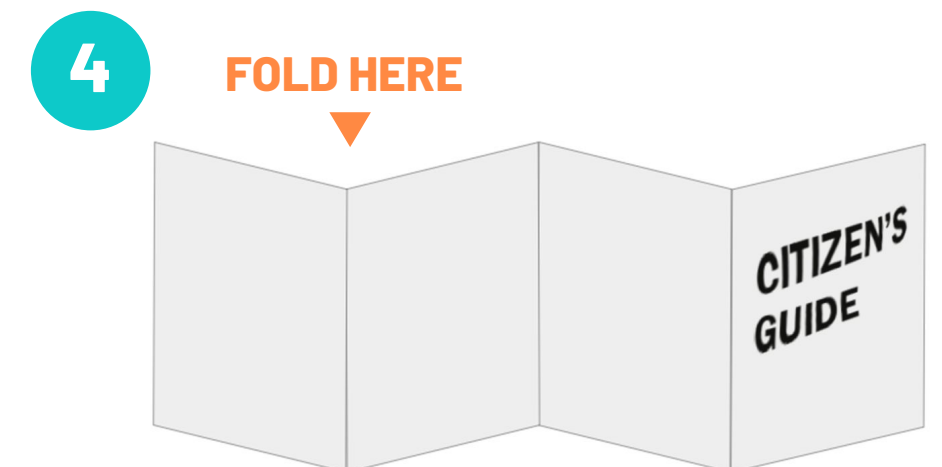
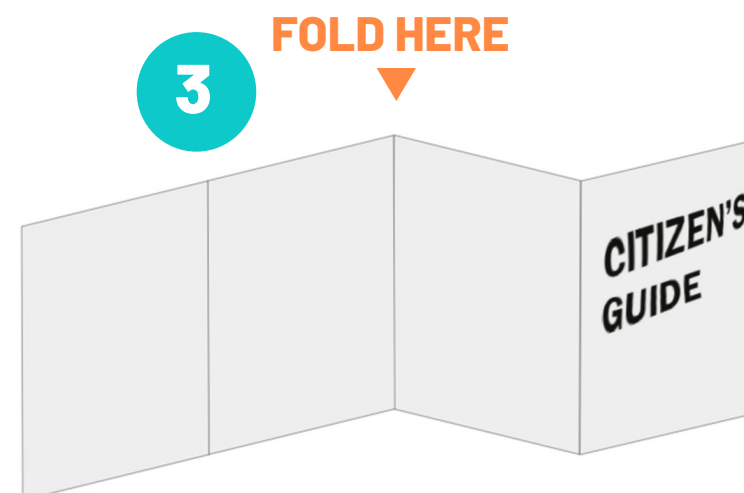
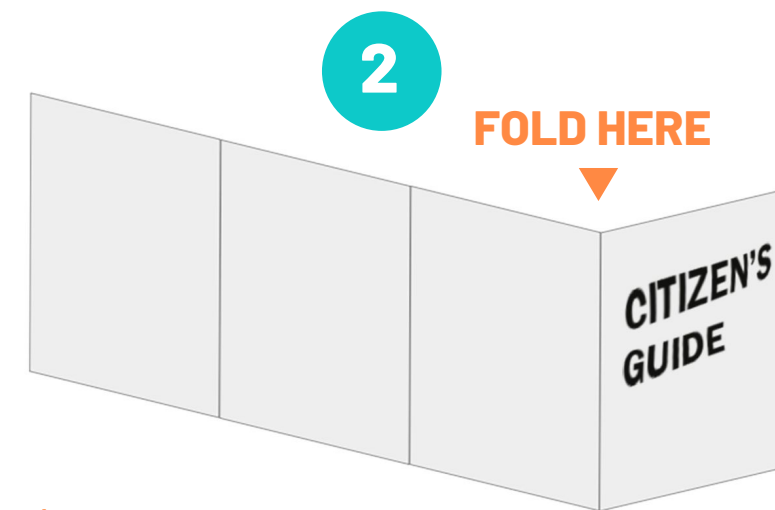
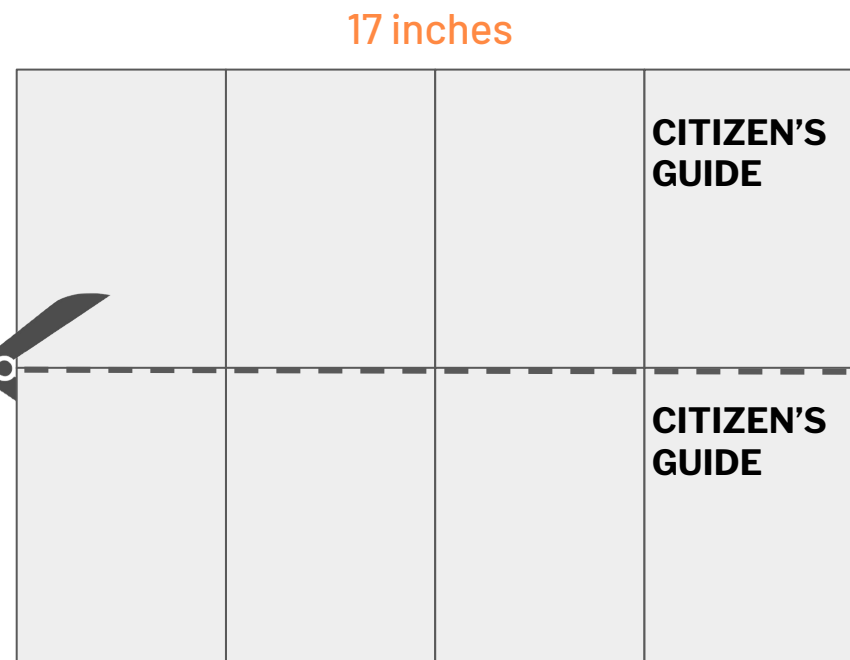
Request double-sided color prints on 11x17-inch paper with a landscape orientation and flipped on the short side.

Note: When printed landscape, some shops call this "ledger" paper.

CUTTING AND FOLDING INSTRUCTIONS

DIY CUTTING AND FOLDING

- 1 **CUT HERE**  Use a paper cutter for a smoother edge.



PRINTSHOP

Most printshops will be able to cut your prints in half for you. Be sure to request a horizontal or lengthwise cut (landscape orientation). Some shops may be able to help with folding. Inquire about a Z-fold.
